Degree Apprenticeships Overview

"Degree Apprenticeships will give people a great head start, combining a full degree with the real life practical skills gained in work and the financial security of a regular pay packet." David Cameron, 2015

Degree Apprenticeships are:

- A government backed initiative to reduce skills gap;
- Degrees are designed by industry employers in partnership with colleges and universities;
- Great way to get on the career ladder

What Is A Degree Apprenticeship?



- An opportunity to gain a full bachelor's degree (Level 6) or master's degree (Level 7)
- Can take between three to six years to complete, depending on the course level.
- Designed in partnership with employers, part-time study takes place at a university or college, with the rest of your time being with your employer
- Only available in England and Wales, applications may be made from all parts of the UK
- Aimed at 18 to 19-year-old school leavers & existing employees

Why should I do a degree apprenticeship?

- The average student "leaves university with £44k of debt, and no guarantee of a job."
 Institute of Fiscal Studies
- Reasons to do a degree apprenticeship are:

1. EARN WHILE YOU LEARN	Get paid work from day one
	 Apprentices can expect to earn over £35,000 per year on completion of their degree!
2. EMPLOYABILITY	Degree apprenticeships do not guarantee a permanent job, but apprentices are highly employable graduates.
	Building a relationship with an employer over an apprenticeship scheme will open doors into an industry.
3. RELEVANT SKILLS	Employers and professional bodies design the apprenticeship programme
	So apprentices obtain the specific practical skills which are necessary for a job.
	Apprentices can move seamlessly from their degree apprenticeship into a skilled profession.

How are degree apprenticeships paid for?

Cost:- £9,000 per year

The funding for degree apprenticeships is divided between the government and your employer.

The government pays two-thirds of your costs and fees, capped at £18,000, while your employer pays the rest.

Apprentices will work for a minimum of 30 hours a week for 30 weeks a year.

Entry Requirements

- The entry requirements for each degree apprenticeship varies for each programme.
- Not all employers are requiring candidates to have A Levels to qualify for applications.
- For example, some employers request candidates have the equivalent of 280 UCAS points.
- Relevant work experience is also considered by employers if other criteria are not met.
- For full entry requirements, it's best to look at university websites and employer's recruitment materials.
- You may be surprised about which degree apprenticeships you are eligible for!

Key Things To Investigate

- What is the apprenticeship and job role does it fit what you're looking for?
- Find out about the employer is it the type of company you want to work for?
- Find out about the training provider, college, or university where you could be studying.
- What qualifications, subjects, and grades are they looking for?
- What essential/desirable skills and experience do they ask for, and what qualities are they are looking for in applicants?
- Does the job require you to work in different locations?
- Would you need to move away from home for work?
- What is the salary, and do they offer any other benefits or facilities you can use?
- What are your three most and least positive aspects of this apprenticeship or job opportunity?

Degree Apprenticeships In London

- BPP Business School are providing two programmes, a BBA (Hons) Chartered Management and BSc (Hons)
 Design and Technology Solutions.
- The University of Roehampton offer a BSc (Hons) Digital and Technology Solutions, specialising in network engineering, software engineering and data analysis.
- Queen Mary University of London are in partnership with Goldman Sachs, GSK, IBM, and have designed an IT Degree Apprenticeship with John Lewis.
- The University of West London have introduced three new programmes; a Chartered Manager Degree Apprenticeship, a Digital and Technology Solutions Manager Degree Apprenticeship, and Healthcare Assistant (Practitioner) Higher Degree Apprenticeship.
- The University of Greenwich and Ravensborne College have yet to declare which courses they are launching next year.
- <u>Pearson College London</u> provide three degree apprenticeship programmes: a Business Management degree in partnership with the BBC, a Chartered Manager Degree Apprenticeship, and a Rotational Degree Apprenticeship, which includes professional work experience with three industry leading companies.
- **Birkbeck, University of London** offer two schemes, a Digital and Technology Solutions Degree Apprenticeship and a Chartered Management Degree Apprenticeship

Software Engineering degree apprenticeship with Custodian Solutions and the University of Exeter - Example

- Tom is working for Custodian Solutions, with structured intervals to attend lectures and complete online classes, in order to gain a BSc Digital and Technology Solutions from the University of Exeter.
- Tom is developing a technical and professional expertise in IT in a real-life working environment.
- His degree is tailored to the specific and relevant skills he needs for a career in software engineering.
- He earns a salary of £20,000 and is debt free as his employer is paying for his degree from a Russell Group university.
